Serbian Panels at Cambridge University

Every year the British Association for Slavonic and Eastern European Studies (BASEES) sponsors an annual conference about Russia, Eastern Europe and the former Soviet Union. This year it was at the University of Cambridge, the United Kingdom from March 31- April 2. There were more than 400 participants from Great Britain, Europe, and North America.

I participated on the Serbian panel about

Russia and the Balkans with other panelists and the public. I met Serbian and other panelists from the participating countries.

During the conference, you could hear very interesting lectures and learn more about Eastern European culture, art, economy, and politics. The theme of the conference was "October Revolution in 1917." Keynote speakers were professors as well as former politicians from Russia, Ukraine, and Belarus. During my stay, I also enjoyed an opportunity to visit

downtown Cambridge.

Cambridge is located around 90 minutes from London by train. The whole history of the town is dedicated to education. Old buildings, churches, and houses describe more than 800 years of the history of education in the United Kingdom. Cambridge University is one of the oldest universities in the world. I discovered that the best way to see Cambridge is from the river. I took a 45 minutes boat ride and had a magnificent view of King's and Trinity Colleges, which are among the 31 colleges

in the University of Cambridge. In 1441, King's College was founded by Henry VI. In 1546, Trinity College was founded by Henry VIII, and is the largest college in Cambridge.

Cambridge is full of small shops, cafes and restaurants where you can enjoy leisure time. They have beautiful gardens that are beautifully maintained and there are a lot of beautiful yellow daffodils.

Cambridge is a very nice and isolated place for studying and living with family.
