On February 17, 2018, there was a marvelous concert "Ruku pod ruku" ("Hand in Hand") featuring Serbian traditional folk dancing and singing in Bellefield Hall at the University of Pittsburgh. This journey through Serbian dance and songs was performed by Sumadija, Serbian Folk Dance Ensemble, Milwaukee, WI; Academy of Serbian Folk Dancing Association "Miroslav Bata Marcetic," Toronto, Canada; Ansambl narodne igre Kolo, Chicago, IL; and Carica Milica Choir, Pittsburgh, PA.

In the crowded hall of cheerful guests, ensembles performed dances from all parts of Serbia such as Crna Trava, Radujevac, Sumadija, Knjazevac, Vranje, Studenica, Gnjilane as well_as from Lika and Northern Dalmatia, Bosilegradsko Krajiste, and Bosanska Posavina, Republic of Srpska. The audience enjoyed every moment of dancing, which was followed by long applause.

a long tradition of perpetuating Serbian cultural heritage in the United States. Sumadija Serbian Folk Dance Ensemble of St. Sava Serbian Orthodox Church in Milwaukee, WI, was founded in 1969 with the support and help of Very Rev. Milan Markovina and Bob Milkovich, the first Artistic Director. Today, Sumadija is led by Michael Malich, the Artistic Director, and Darinka Sever, President, and it has 193 dancers from ages 6 to 35.

The Academy of Serbian Folk Dancing Association performs Serbian dances and music in Canada with over 450 participants divided into seven ensembles and one folk band. In 2004, the Academy was founded by Miroslav Bata Marcetic, who is the Artistic Director, and Dusan Suvajac who is the Music Director.
