MIHAJLO I. PUPIN – PATH TOWARDS THE LIGHT

An enjoyable animated-documentary about the life and works of Mihajlo I. Pu-pin, Serbian-American Scientist and Inventor. He was known as a prolific elec-tric inventor who holds 34 patents. His discoveries and devices are widely used in telecommunications and sonar-related technology. He was also a diplomat, initiative of establishing 2015 as the International Year of Light.

"Radiovision" brings to life stories buried in the archives of one of the oldest public radio stations in Europe - Radio Belgrade. Creative team researched through the archive of audio interviews recorded between 1950 – 1990. The Creative Team cut the original material in 3 minute stories and created and pro duced the animated video that visualizes stories with original voices of Nobel Prize winner Ivo Andric, actress Rahela Ferari, famous novelists Borislav Pekić and Miloš Crnjanski, and other prominent Serbian historical figures.









"TESLA NATION"

Qualifies for Academy **Award Nomination**

The Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences, Los Angeles, CA qualified "Tesla Nation" by Zeljko Mirkovic for the nomination of the Academy Award Oscar 2020 for feature documentary.

"If I am fortunate enough to fulfill at least some of my ideals, that will do good for the whole mankind," said Nikola Tesla (1856 - 1943), Serbian-American Scientist and Inventor. Spanning more than 200 years, the film recounts the stories of many Serbian-Americans throughout history from George Fisher, the first famous Serb, to Mihajlo I. Pupin and Nikola Tesla, Serbian-American scientists and inventors, World War I and II immigrants up to the present time. It stresses Serbian-American contributions to building America and the world.

Other distinguished Serbian-Americans are noted in the film, such as Walt Bogdanich, Gordana Vunjak-Novakovic, Peter Bogdanovich, Karl Malden, Helen Delich-Bentley, Steve Tesich, Milana Bizic, John Martich, David Vuich, Branko Terzic, Branko Tupanjac, Obrad Kesic, Alex Machaskee, Michael Djordjevic, and Dr. Nenad Janicijevic among oth-
